that exist today. P75 is about 125 years older than B, yet it is not an ancestor of B. Instead, B was copied from an earlier ancestor of P75 (see Porter 1962, 363-76; 1967, 71-80).

The late 9% are resolved by comparison to earlier manuscripts

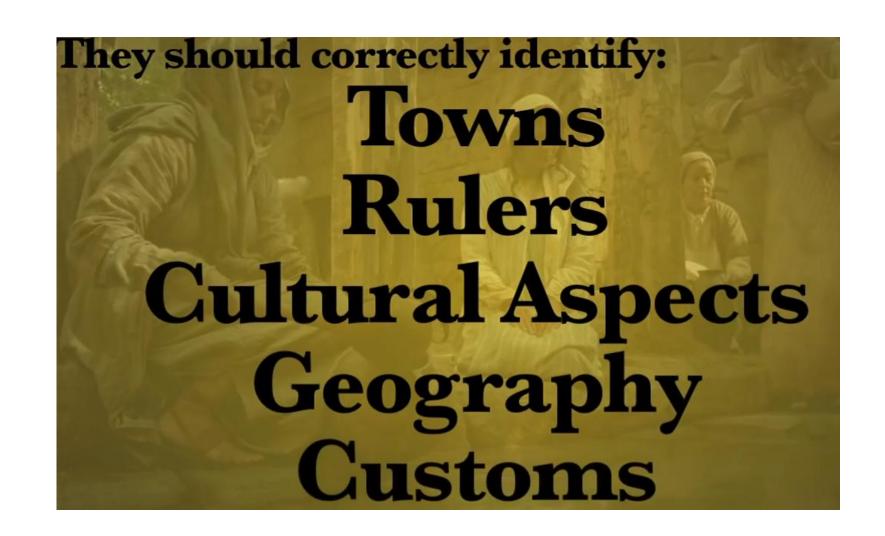

If the New Testament was written by eyewitnesses and is not a fabrication from later imposters, then they should be able to get most of their facts right.

Some scholars have offered that though the Gospels were not intended as history books that the history contained in them is so detailed and accurate that not only did they help direct research in this area but reliably confirm the details of the Gospels, related to geography, dates, rulers and other details which lends support to the veracity and reliability of the Gospels.

The Temple Tax

²⁴ When they came to Capernaum, the collectors of the <u>two-drachma tax</u> went up to Peter and said, "<u>Does your teacher not pay the tax?</u>" ²⁵ He said, "Yes." And when he came into the house, Jesus spoke to him first, saying, "What do you think, Simon? From whom do kings of the earth take toll or tax? From their sons or from others?" ²⁶ And when he said, "From others," Jesus said to him, "Then the sons are free. ²⁷ However, not to give offense to them, go to the sea and cast a hook and take the first fish that comes up, and when you open its mouth you will find <u>a shekel.</u> ^[9] Take that and give it to them <u>for me and for yourself.</u>"

Matthew records the appropriate currency exchange:

1 Shekel = 4 drachma
